## **TopTips for August**

- 1Continue dead-heading
- 2 Clear fallen leaves from roses with black spot. Dispose of these in your dustbin
- 3 Prune shrubs eg hebe and lavender after flowering, leaving some green growth
- 4 When dry, water rhododendrons & camellias so that flower buds form for next spring
- 5 Cut out flowered stems of rambling roses to the ground. Tie in new shoots.
- 6 Sow fast-growing 'catch crops' eg rocket, radish, lettuce & turnips
- 7 Keep protective measures against carrot fly until autumn
- 8 Do not use lawn weedkillers if dry as they only work when weeds are active
- 9 Mow summer flowering meadows at end of month. Leave hay to allow seeds to drop
- 10 Plant out autumn flowering bulbs such as Colchicum and Crocus specious

# Our next meeting we will be our annual <u>Autumn Flower and Vegetable Display</u>. The classes are as follows:

- 1 Vase of flowers, 3 stems of 1 cultivar
- 2 Bowl of mixed flowers and foliage, arranged for all around effect, 12" x 12"
- 3 Vase of shrubs, 3 or more stems flowering or foliage, could be mixed varieties
- 4 Pot plant, flowering or foliage
- 5 Display of fruit, 1 or more cultivars
- 6 Display of vegetables, 1 or more cultivars
- 7 Pot of cacti or succulents
- 8 An arrangement of herbs
- 9 Preserve, jam, jelly or marmalade
- 10 Home-made chutney or relish
- 11 Baking: biscuit, bread or cake made with unusual ingredient from your garden
- 12 Floral art. Seasonal arrangement
- 13 Arts&Crafts Display. Anything hand made is eligible for this popular section of the show.
- 14 Achimenes. Any members who still have these in flower may bring these in memory of Terry Harvie
- 15 Potato competition- potatoes should be in named, transparent plastic bags also sunflower head competition entries- the largest head wins
