Pat's 10 jobs for July:

- 1. Summer prune wisteria either this month or next by cutting back whippy shoots to 5 or 6 buds from main stem.
- 2. Prune large rambler roses now if they've finished flowering to keep within bounds unless you want to retain flowering stems for autumn hips
- 3. Prune early summer flowering shrubs such as weigela and philadelphus by cutting back to strong lower shoots and thinning out a third of woody stems
- 4. Lift and divide bearded iris retaining young pieces with leaves then trim and replant making sure the rhizomes are not buried. Discard old woody rhizomes
- 5. Sow biennial herbs now for winter such as parsley, coriander and chervil
- 6. Start to lift garlic if the foliage is more yellow than green and hang up to dry in a sunny place
- 7. Tomato plant side shoots draw energy from the plant so pinch off as soon as they appear
- 8. Stop picking rhubarb now but water and mulch plants well
- 9. Sow carrots now for winter and thin out for large carrots
- 10. Make a woodpile in a corner of your garden to encourage shelter for wildlife. We had 5 toads under ours at the allotments.

Help wanted

There is a rota on the Noticeboard tonight, for anyone who feels they can help out with either selling raffle tickets or with serving refreshments occasionally. If enough people sign up, you will only be called on a couple of times a year and it would really help relieve the Committee a bit.

Pond Life

The RHS has been running a great "wild about gardens" campaign recently. Adding a pond, large or small, is one of the best things you can do for wildlife in your garden.

Of course it's great if you can fit in a good sized, deep pond (like Monty's!) - but even a washing-up bowl or old sink can be re-purposed as a mini pond, providing wildlife can get in/out. The RHS leaflet about ponds is on the Noticeboard tonight, and on our website. Lots of garden centres sell beautiful aquatic plants, Thomsons in Shooters Hill has some good ones. The more toads, frogs and dragonflies you can encourage to the garden, the less real "gardeners" pests there will be.
