Winter in Vija's garden

Last year I wrote in the Newsletter that I had winter aconites in flower, hellebores and, of course snowdrops, with a few pulmonaria just making an early start. In addition, this year I can see that all my camellias are breaking their buds.

I also noted the spread of the box moth caterpillar which has now, despite my best efforts, decimated my bushes. I have had to remove all from my garden. Greenwich Park have also now lost all their box hedging in the parterre in the lower herb garden and in other places in the rest of the park. They are in the process of replacing it but it will take some time to look good again.

Pat's 10 jobs for January:

- 1. Time to cut back dead stems of perennials and compost them if they are not too dry but do watch out for overwintering ladybirds which often hibernate in thick stems.
- 2. The ground is absolutely soaking at the moment so better to leave any heavy digging where soil is compacted until it dries out a bit.
- 3. Move scented shrubs in pots like Viburnham bodnantense and Sarcococca and maybe Daphne close to your back or front door so you can catch the scent.
- 4. This is a good time to prune many deciduous trees but not magnolia or stone fruit trees like plums which are better pruned in the summer. This helps prevent disease.
- 5. Look out for leaf spot on hellebores and violas which are a result of fungal disease and remove the leaves as soon as possible avoiding adding these to the compost heap Removing old leaves on hellebores improves the look of the plant as the flowers emerge.
- 6. Now is the time to do hardwood cuttings from shrubs and roses by using cuttings 6 to 12 inches long cutting below a bud at the base and with a slanted cut at the top. Insert either in the ground or in pots and await events. I always grow all my blackcurants from cuttings which root easily.
- 7. Make sure that ponds are clear of fallen leaves as these will pollute the water very quickly but watch out for hibernating wildlife.
- 8. Prune redcurrants, gooseberries and whitecurrants now by pruning side shoots two buds from their base. Shorten main branches by a quarter pruning to an outward facing bud.
- 9. Encourage birds into the garden with feeders and make sure they have clean water for drinking and bathing.
- 10. In the veg garden remember to keep harvesting kale, chard and perpetual spinach to prevent it going to seed. My kale has been wonderful all winter and doesn't stop cropping.

Happy winter gardening, lets hope for some dry weather!
