Grow Friends, Grow Fit ... Grow a Garden!

The end of the year seems to be creeping up on us very fast, although the lovely weather is allowing us to continue to enjoy life outdoors. On the CABAHS Committee we continue to work hard to engage your interest with activities which fit these difficult times. The visit to Hall Place was successful and we have another planned to Great Comp. (Please note that during September and October RHS members have free access to the gardens). At short notice, three CABAHS members including myself, agreed to open our gardens to raise money for Macmillan Cancer Support and to provide an opportunity for members to come together. It is probably not the best time of year to open your garden to public view, when plants are no longer at their best, but the event went well and visitors were kind with their comments and I was struck by their generosity. With many of us taking advantage of the lovely weather and visiting gardens, Anna has contributed the following:

"Chenies Manor Gardens looked lovely when CABAHS' members visited during July 2019 for the Rare Plant Fair. But when I visited the gardens on the recent August Bank holiday Monday I thought they looked absolutely exquisite. The gardens are planted up with what seems like hundreds of varieties of dahlias and all labelled. The colours in the sunken garden were dazzling jewel-like, consisting of colour-coordinated shades of purple, wine, and magenta, with an array of flowering salvias, asters, phlox, verbenas etc. to compliment the arrangement. Then there is the white garden, pink border and the hot border set against the warm brickwork of the Manor. The gardens are open Wednesdays and Thursdays 2-5 until the end of October and tickets are obtained online. Afternoon tea (pre-booked) can

be enjoyed in the gardens where the garden furniture is spread out. Very well organised. Not to be missed -see their tulip video."

Gardening notes

- The Chelsea Physic Garden are holding a Houseplant Festival in their embankment location on 10th October, 10.30 - 5.30. Booking is essential
- o **Great Dixter** is holding its Unusual Plant Fair on 3rd and 4th October. Again booking is essential.
- Our website has a long list of virtual tours and visits, with podcasts and videos you can subscribe to.

Pat's 10 jobs for September:

- 1. Now is the time to split perennials to either spread around the garden or give away or donate to the sales table when we can have one again!
- 2. Make sure you keep deadheading dahlias to keep your display going. Dead blooms are pointed, so don't pull off the round ones which are the new ones.
- 3. Order your spring bulbs soon and then start planting narcissi and others when you can, but don't plant tulips until November
- 4. Finish taking cuttings of perennials and tender perennials and plant up, as they need a chance to get going before the winter
- 5. Don't forget to deadhead plants in hanging baskets and window boxes as they may be good for a while to keep going through the autumn
- 6. Plant up pots for winter interest, the garden centres are full of cyclamen and violas which should see you through
- 7. Control powdery mildew by removing affected leaves and making sure you water well. Don't add them to the compost heap though. I love Monardas and they are martyrs to it and can look pretty awful this time of year.
- 8. Help green tomatoes to ripen by removing any leaves that may be shading them from the sun. They still have time to ripen before you start making green tomato chutney!
- 9. Time to lift your maincrop potatoes. Wash and dry them well before you store in paper sacks in the dark.
- 10. Try to net ponds now before leaf fall which will pollute the water and turn it green.

Local Hero

If you visit Blackheath Standard shops, try to walk past the end of Delafield Road and admire the pretty new planters and green roof on the bin store at Gingko Financial's offices. The owner is on a mission to reduce littering and anti-social behaviour by greening and caring for this little corner. And it is working, they say there is a lot less fly tipping and silver canisters since he started doing it!
