This month we welcome Dusty Gedge, who will be talking to us about roof gardens. Originally we had planned that the presentation would take place on the roof of IKEA, but like so many things over the last year or so, this has turned out not to be possible!

The summer solstice has now been and gone and we are at last experiencing some weather that is more like summer. Members have taken the opportunity to get out and see some gardens and below you can see some brief summaries of visits which have been made.

Pat made a visit to Riverhill Himalayan Garden near Sevenoaks

Riverhill Himalayan Garden commands a beautiful setting on the side of a hill off the A21, It's a historic hillside house and garden owned by the Rogers family and is renowned for its collection of Rhododendrons and Azaleas and many beautiful trees. There's a walled garden, a rock garden, a maze and a bluebell wood but all are set into the hillside and some of the climb is not for the fainthearted, as it is quite steep. When we first visited, the walled garden had just been restored but is now maturing and has a vegetable garden at the top end. There's a terraced cafe too at the entrance and a reasonably well stocked nursery selling plants and garden paraphernalia. Pat's 10 jobs for July:

- 1. If you didn't do it last month prune your wisteria now taking back those whippy side shoots to 2 or 3 buds.
- 2. Keep picking your sweetpeas and don't allow any to go to seed and feed every 10 days with a high potash feed keeping well- watered too as they hate to dry out.
- 3. Weeds are growing fast at this time of year so keep a lookout and remember the old adage if you allow them to seed, you'll have 7 years of weeds!
- 4. Take cuttings of Salvias, Penstemon and Pelargonium now and trim to just below a leaf node and plant round the edge of a pot into gritty compost.
- 5. Also watch out for blackspot on roses and remove badly affected leaves and do not add to the compost heap where it will spread even more.
- 6. Sow biennials now such as wallflowers, either directly into finely tilled soil or into seed trays. Once they reach a reasonable size pot on into individual pots.
- 7. Repot house plants that are actively growing into the next size pot and feed at least fortnightly during the growing season.
- 8. Make sure to remove side shoots on cordon grown tomatoes and keep tying into their supports and again feed every 10 days with tomato food or comfrey feed which is free if you have a ready supply of comfrey although it doesn't smell too good!
- 9. Pick soft fruit regularly and freeze after washing if you don't have enough to do anything with and don't forget to protect with netting as I did and the pigeons helped themselves.
- 10. Leave an area of your lawn to grow long to enable daisies and other wild flowers to flower and attract pollinators.

August Meeting - August 16th

This will be a variation on our usual "Gardeners Question Time" meeting. Excitingly, we intend to hold the meeting in the Charlton House walled gardens instead of on Zoom.
